REGULATIONS

- 1 Entry forms must be handed to the Trading Hut by the weekend before the Show or emailed to chair@gphs.org.uk as early as possible but not later than **10 pm on the Monday prior to the Show**. Entries submitted after this time will not be accepted.
- 2 All exhibits, including flowers, must be staged between 9.30 am and 11.30 am on the day of the Show.
- 3 Exhibitors are requested to stage exhibits as early as possible and please leave after staging to be out of the hall by 11.45 am.
- 3 Vegetables must be exhibited in a clean state.
- 4 All exhibitors are asked to label their exhibits if possible with the name of the variety. Correct, clear labelling may be an advantage in close competition.
- 5 All exhibits must be made in the name of the paid-up member.
- 6 Exhibitors may only enter one exhibit in any class. Two or more persons may not compete separately in the same class with produce from the same garden and/or allotment. If members of a household wish to share the credit and prizes, then the exhibits should be entered in joint names.
- 7 The words "kind" and "variety" in the Schedule are as defined in the latest RHS Show Handbook. Potatoes, carrots, peas are "kinds" and Desiree, Autumn King, Granny Smith are examples of "varieties".
- 8 All exhibits, except those in Classes 28-35 and 61-6,3 must have been grown by the exhibitor who may have employed labour for rough work only.
- 9 Exhibit cards and Award Cards must not be removed before the close of the Show. Items not removed at the end of the Show will be disposed of by the Society.
- 10 Judges' sheets must not be removed and remain the property of the GPHS in case of disputed awards.
- 11 The Society, in consultation with the Judges, may withhold any award in any class, or make additional awards at its discretion.
- 12 The RHS Show Handbook will be used by the Society and the Judges as a guide and the decision of the Judges must be regarded as final.
- 13 Exhibitors are responsible for placing and removing their own exhibits. **Exhibitors must remove their exhibits at the end of the Show to ensure the hall is left in a clean state and minimise inconvenience to others.**
- 14 Any contingency not provided for in these Regulations is to be subject to the decision of the Society.
- 15 **Collection of vegetables, class 21, quantity required and maximum points.**

36*	Sponge sandwich, Use our recipe: two 20cm sandwich tins, cream together 200g margarine and 200 g caster sugar until light and well creamed. Beat in 4 eggs a little at a time, fold in 200g sifted self-raising flour and 1 tsp baking powder, followed by approx one tablespoon of milk. Place mixture in 2 prepared tins and bake in a moderate oven 190°C, 375°F or gas mark 5 for approx 20 mins. When cool, sandwich together with jam and dust with caster sugar.	1
